

Citing Openly Licensed Images & Where to Find Openly Licensed Images

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This URL is long and cumbersome. If you wanted to include that image in your course, you would cite it as such:

[Dinner for two](#) by [DaiLuo](#) licensed under [CC by 2.0](#)

1. The first hyperlink connects the title of the image to the URL of the image itself.
2. The second hyperlink is connected to the profile page of the author/creator.
3. The third hyperlink is connected to the Creative Commons page for the license type that the author selected for his work.

On Flickr, you can find the license type by clicking on the text that says “Some rights reserved,” which
